- 1 Read about this humanitarian, philosopher, physician and a medical missionary.
 - 1. News had spread through the forest that a doctor had come to Lamberene, and even before their boxes of medicines arrived on the river-boat, the sick people began to crowd around the house. Every morning when he stepped out of his house he found them waiting for him, thirty or forty coloured people sitting on the ground in the shade of the house. These were not the *town Africans* from the coast, but simple wandering people from the forest. Old people, young people, babies; men, women and children; ill with all kinds of diseases, weak from lack of food.
 - 2. "Here among us everybody is ill", said a young man; and an old chief shook his grey head sadly." Yes, our land eats its own children". All their faces were turned towards Schweitzer for comfort; he was the only man for hundreds of miles who could help them.
 - 3. When his boxes of supplies came there was no place to put them. For a time he cared for the sick people in the open air, and ran for shelter when the heavy rains came pouring down. Things became better when he cleaned out an old hen-house and used this as the centre of his work. It was difficult not to begin to despair. There was so much to do. What could one man do against a whole world of suffering?
 - 4. During these first months his wife gave him help and strength. She worked as hard as he did- first caring for the house and giving orders to the untrained servants; then scurrying over to the hen-house to help the doctor with operations and care for the sick.
 - 5. It was a happy day when the doctor found among the sick people a keen-looking coloured man who spoke French and who had been a cook to a white man. "Would you like to come to me as cook and also to help me in the hospital?" Schweitzer asked. The man's face brightened with pleasure. "Yes, Doctor," he said, "I will help you with everything."
 - 6. That was the beginning of Joseph, who stayed with them for many years. He was an unusual man, kind, keen, hard-working, and honest. He could speak eight languages, and although he could not read or write French he never made a mistake in taking down a bottle of medicine from the shelf. "How do you know which one to take?" Schweitzer once asked him. "The bottles are nearly the same".
 - 7. "I remember the look of the words on the paper", was the simple answer. Joseph had said he would help with everything, and he did. It was Joseph who helped in the hospital, who translated for the Schweitzers, who helped them to understand the ways of Africa.
